Katherine Campbell has agreed to speak – she is currently completing a biography of her father, MRAF The Lord Douglas of Kirtleside, who was the first OC of 43 Squadron in 1916. REUNION 2018

Seventy-three Association members joined us for last year's annual reunion at the RAF Club. We looked across the centenary of the RAF. Our guests of honour were Angela Findlater, the daughter of Capt John Lightfoot Trollope, of 6 kills in one day fame in 1918, and Air Cdre David Bradshaw, the Tornado and Lightning Force Commander. Air Cdre David spoke about the future of the RAF and the new Lightning fighter aircraft. The Beedle Trophy was presented to Gill Howie in recognition of all her support to 43 Sqn and Association over many years.

BANNIAL MEMORIAL REDEDICATION

RAF Fylingdales contacted us early last year to seek our support for the rededication of the Bannial Memorial in June 2018. This memorial commemorates the shooting down of the first Luftwaffe aircraft over England in World War 2, by Flt Lt Peter Townsend and Sgt Hallowes on 3 February 1940, flying 43 Sqn Hurricanes. The original site of the memorial, next to a main road near Whitby, was becoming increasingly dangerous to visit, so Whitby Town Council moved the memorial to a safer location. Jim Campbell represented the Association, laying a wreath on our behalf.



CENTENARY COMMEMORATIONS IN FRANCE

La Gorgue was one of 43 Squadron's bases in WWI for a short period in early 1918. We have worked with a local archaeologist and historian, Serge Comini, to help support the centenary commemorations on 15th September 2018. The site of La Gorgue lies in the grounds of Beaupré Abbey and his work has unearthed a huge number of artifacts of the small airfield, many of which are now on display in La Gorgue Museum. The Mayor, town councillors and town band held a commemoration at the Cemetery and Katherine Campbell placed a wreath at the memorial on our behalf. The event was attended by descendants of airmen who had flown from Merville and La Gorgue. Serge has provided a great deal of detail to Katherine for her background research into the biography she is writing about her father, MRAF The Lord Douglas of Kirtleside, our first OC. Serge also used the centenary event to launch his own book on the history of the area in WWI – "Abbaye Notre-Dame de Beaupré-sur-la-Lys, des Hommes sur la Terres.....et les Chemins des Dames". The following week Katherine attended the commemorations at St Omer for the RAF. Katherine reports that "once again, the ceremonies were magnificent, and the Mayor of St Omer, the Armed Forces Minister, and all sorts of other French dignitaries were at the Cathedral, the Cemetery at Longuenesse and at the aerodrome with the British Air Forces Memorial. There was much wreath-laying, including by French school children, each of whom had 'adopted' an airman at the Cemetery and laid a tiny little posy on each grave. It was very moving, and the French people involved could not have been more kind. We had a flypast of four Rafale aircraft too - they didn't have to do it, but they did, for our Air Force! Am attaching a photo of Peter and me with Alain Chevalier, the Mayor of Thérouanne, a small town to the south of St Omer, who hosted us impeccably for the day and was charming."



OTHER CENTENARY ISSUES

The RAF100 and the associated events prompted over 30 requests for information on former members of the squadron. Typically these requests were from family members or aviation historians seeking access to deceased personnel records. We were able help using contacts in the RAF Disclosures and Records Office, the National Archive at Kew and the Air Historical Branch (the RAF's formal archivists). Our own archives have proved useful time and again. We supported a German TV company filming their version of 'Who Do You Think You Are?' One of the trails for information led to a Hurricane pilot on 43 Squadron who went missing in 1940.

Most importantly, Arthur Howell celebrated his 100th birthday in August. Arthur was on 43 Squadron in 1944-45. Bob Iles, our former Association Secretary continues to visit Arthur regularly.

Information Collected

administration and information technology system support and development.
Security of Information
Only the President, Chairman and Secretary will be able to access your full details. Other committee
members may hold limited details applicable to their roles, with the consent of the individual
members concerned, eg when distributing hard copies of the annual newsletter. We use organisational, administrative, technical and physical security measures to safeguard your
Personal Information and to help ensure that your information is processed promptly and accurately.
Specifically:
☐ Association committee members use personal IT devices to maintain and store information
applicable to their roles. Access to these devices is password protected and adequate anti-virus
software is installed;
☐ When using electronic communications with a membership-wide distribution, appropriate measures will be taken to withhold member's email addresses by use of a mailshot application or
the "Bcc" facility. To facilitate Association business, committee members are deemed to have
agreed to their email addresses being visible on emails requiring group discussion.
Information Sharing
We will share your Personal Information only with your consent, such as with:
Other members via the Association membership list.
☐ Aviation historians researching specific historical events.
☐ Families of recently deceased Association members who seek support in organising funerals or memorial services.
□ No personal information will be provided on deceased members unless we gain permission from
families.
☐ We will share information on events from squadron histories and archives only where these are in
the public domain, such as Jimmy Beedle's biography, 'The Fighting Cocks'.
Retention of Information
We will keep your Personal Information only for as long as we need to support your membership, unless we are required to keep it for longer periods. Specifically:
your Personal Information that forms part of the Association's financial records may be stored by
us for 7 years after you end your membership, due to Inland Revenue requirements;
☐ if we lose contact, after 2 years your information will be transferred to the Dormant List where
your last given contact details will be maintained until you decide otherwise;
if you terminate your membership and your Personal Information is no longer necessary for legal
or regulatory needs, we will take reasonable steps to destroy such information securely.
Access to Your Information The Association encourages you to check regularly that all Personal Information held by us is
accurate and up to date. If you believe that any information we hold about you is incorrect or
incomplete, you may ask us to correct or remove this information from our records. The best way to
do this is via a contact change request on the Association website,
www.43squadronassociation.com, or directly to the Secretary via email, telephone, text or letter.
Any corrections or new information will be updated promptly.
Your Rights You have the right to access, update, erase, change or correct your Personal Information.
Specifically, you have the right to:
□ withdraw your consent for our use of your Personal Information at any time, where our processing
is based on your consent
□ restrict and/or object to the use of your Personal Information
□ request a copy of your Personal Information we have about you
If you have questions about this privacy statement or how your information is handled or wish to
make a complaint or exercise your rights, please contact the Honorary Secretary in the first instance.
Data Protection Roles
Under the GDPR, a Data Protection Officer (DPO) must be appointed if:
□ you are a public authority (except for courts acting in their judicial capacity);

□ your core activities require large scale, regular and systematic monitoring of individuals (for example, online behaviour tracking); or

□ your core activities consist of large scale processing of special categories of data or data relating to criminal convictions and offences.

The Association does not conduct such activities, nor does it collect or use Sensitive Information. A DPO has not therefore been appointed. For enquiries relating to information management within the Association, please contact the Secretary.
